

# **Ashland Lakeside**

Ashland Lakeside is now really starting to take shape, and there's some great progress being made.

Firstly, the building has a 'proper' name, which we think reflects the surroundings and its Ashland location. The Steering Group encouraged input from all residents to select a name, and of the fifteen suggestions, three were short-listed to go out to a vote. A vote was conducted at the end of March, promoted via Facebook, and Ashland Lakeside gained nearly half of the votes.

With the interior fit-out being conducted very competently by MK College, and the deck now taking shape, attention is turning to the external fittings and security of the building, and landscaping. The building is fitted with CCTV cameras, and railings will be fitted around the decking area. The front door is now on and The Parks Trust have already started to support us by clearing some of the weeds around the building and they will be planting shrubs over the coming months. They will be seeding the lawn early in the autumn and planting trees and shrubs in January.

We're very grateful for the generosity of Bridgman & Bridgman in Wolverton for their support with the sedum roof. If you're tall enough, or lucky to have a 'birds-eye view', you'll notice that only two-thirds of the roof is completed. The remaining section will be used by Bridgman & Bridgman as a test site to trial new plants and techniques. In exchange for this, they offered us a considerable saving on cost, which was warmly received by those managing the budget!

The building has been inspected for fire safety, and internal capacity has been confirmed for 50 people sitting or standing, with 40 sitting around tables (such as for a quiz or a meal). We'll have enough tables and chairs to suit the numbers, and the building feels spacious and airy with these configurations.

Many are now asking about hiring the building and when it may be open. There is still work to be done, and we need that to be completed before we can arrange insurance. We're still waiting on an approximate date, and we'll let you know as soon as one is available. The Steering Group is

intending to hold an opening event, so watch this space!

### Simpson: then and now

In recent years, the Simpson History Group has contributed to the programme for the Heritage Open Days, held in September www.heritageopendays.org.uk. Milton Keynes has one of the most extensive programmes of events in the country.

This September, our showcase will take the form of a projected display of images of Simpson properties and their surroundings from the past, alongside some 2022 equivalents.

Images of 'then' come from an extensive archive of postcards and old photographs, many from the first half of the 20th century. We have started to capture their 2022 equivalents, photographed as near as possible from the original viewpoints. ### **Salted Caramel Cake**



For the icing:

40g icing sugar

For the topping:

75g butter

One of the attractions at recent social events in Simpson Village Hall - most recently the Platinum Jubilee celebrations - has been the opportunity of tasting a slice of Nigel Chitty's salted caramel cake. The ever-generous Simpson resident has agreed to share the secrets of his stand-out baking success (with modest acknowledgement to Waitrose)

#### **Ingredients:**

#### For the cake:

- 175g butter, softened, plus extra for greasing
- 125g light brown muscovado sugar
- 200g Nestlé Carnation Caramel
- 200g self-raising flour
- 1 teaspoon salted caramel flavour \*
- 3 large free range eggs



• 75g light brown muscovado sugar 2 tablespoon Nestlé Carnation Caramel 1 teaspoon salted caramel flavour \*

• 1 tablespoon feuilletine \* 1 tablespoon honeycomb \* 1 teaspoon bronze crunch \*

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C, gas mark 4. Grease the base and sides of a deep, 20cm round, loose-bottomed cake tin and line the base with baking parchment.
- 2. With an electric whisk, beat together the butter, sugar, caramel, flour, salted caramel flavour and eggs in a bowl until combined.
- 3. Tip the mixture into the cake tin. Smooth the top and bake for 40-45 minutes or until risen and set in the middle (cover with foil after 30 minutes to prevent it over-browning, if required). Cool in the tin.
- **4.** To make the icing, melt together the butter, sugar, caramel and salted caramel flavour in a pan until smooth, stirring constantly. Remove from the heat, sift in the icing sugar and stir together. Cool until barely warm.
- 5. Remove the cake from the tin and peel off the base paper. Spoon over the icing and spread it out, letting it drizzle down the sides of the cake. Mix together the feuillitine, honeycomb and bronze crunch, and sprinkle over the cake.

\* Available under the 'Waitrose Cooks' Ingredients' banner, though at the time of writing there appears to be a supply problem with feuilletine. It's also available online but you have to buy a lot. I've seen a suggestion that corn flakes could be used as a substitute but they would have to be broken into very fine pieces. Unless you really want the texture, I'd be inclined to leave it out altogether.

Bronze crunch is also available from Tesco.

### New trees

In March, SERCO planted four young trees in Simpson: a walnut at the entrance to Bowlers Close, a weeping birch at the entrance to Abbey Road (see photos), and a fig and an un-labelled tree on the verge beside the road leaving the village, towards Fenny Stratford.

Newly planted trees require regular watering if they are to become established – particularly over the summer months when rain may be in short supply. We are, therefore, very grateful to residents living close to the trees for undertaking this task. The evidence that all four trees are flourishing is testament to their perseverance.


## News from St. Thomas' Church
