# Green, greener, greenest



In January 2019, Milton Keynes Council declared a Climate Emergency and committed to:

- Make Milton Keynes 'The Greenest City' in the World;
- Be carbon neutral by 2030.

MKC is developing a wide-ranging Action Plan to achieve these targets and members of the Parish Council have participated in workshops to look in more detail at what needs to be done.

At the Parish Council meeting on 2 March the following Statement of Intent was agreed:

Simpson and Ashland Parish Council endorses Milton Keynes Council's commitments. In all decision-making and day-to-day actions, it will seek to support the achievement of these targets.

Specifically, the PC will, in 2020:

- 1. Carry out a biodiversity audit and resident engagement in Simpson in order to develop a plan to maximise the local habitat for flora and fauna;
- 2. Use its role as the contract manager of open space within the parish to work with SERCO and residents to support this plan;
- Engage with the Parks Trust to support the management of the green space in Ashland, to maximise benefit for local flora and fauna;
- Be led by ethical and environmental standards in its management of assets such as Simpson Village Hall and, in future, the Ashland Meeting Space, and when considering planning applications;

- 5. To encourage and develop the use of public transport by those who live, visit and work in the parish.
- Carry out community engagement to decide other ways to promote and support MK Council's Climate Emergency commitments.

#### **Action in Simpson and Ashland**

Simpson has many advantages when it comes to supporting and enhancing biodiversity: there are open spaces, established hedgerows, a variety of trees, the river, the canal and its towpath, the Linear Park, and domestic gardens of all shapes and sizes. All of these – singly and in combination – offer the potential to address ways in which our natural surroundings can become richer and more diverse and to stem the declines which are linked to global warming, carbon emissions and the like.

The Parish Council has commissioned Simpson resident Rebecca Hiorns to carry out a survey of landscape features and habitats in Simpson which will provide a plan and a good understanding of the range of different habitats and how they are connected. She will also record notable species present in different areas. This better understanding of existing habitats and how they are being managed will help to highlight opportunities for biodiversity enhancement.

Rebecca's report will be available before the Annual Parish Meeting on 26 May and that meeting will be an opportunity for residents to contribute ideas and experience to help develop an action plan. Rebecca has carried out a similar exercise in Woughton Park at the request of Old Woughton PC. will provide a plan and a good understanding of the range of different habitats and how they are connected. I will also record notable species present in different areas. This better understanding of the existing habitats, and how they are being managed will help to highlight opportunities for biodiversity enhancement.

The large majority of the open space in Ashland is managed by the Parks Trust (who also have stewardship of the Linear Park) and the Parish Council will continue to work with them and draw on their experience and expertise to make the environment greener and to understand what needs to be done to keep it that way. Elsewhere in this issue there are details of the Parks Trust Community Action Day in Ashland on Sunday 19 April.

#### **Looking ahead - Heritage Open Days**

The (national) theme of Heritage Open Days in September 2020 is 'Hidden Nature'. Over recent years Simpson has contributed events, exhibitions and walks to the Milton Keynes programme and for this September we have begun to plan a walk that will focus on the natural heritage in and around the village.

#### **Become involved**

There is a lot of expertise, interest and commitment in the parish to all of these issues - witness the Simpson Garden Group's 'Open Gardens' programme and the tireless work of the Simpson in Bloom group. Add to that the personal knowledge of birds, mammals, wild flowers, trees, amphibians, fungi etc and it's quick to see the potential for informed 'citizen science' to contribute to enhancing our local environment. This year, The Parks Trust, the charity that cares for the greenspace in Milton Keynes, are organising a series of Community Action Days. We want to be able to meet local people in their local park and work together on a series of vital tasks to make a positive contribution to the area.

The first Community Action Day is in Ashland in April - dedicated to helping local trees grow. On Sunday 19 April from 10.00 am -12.00 pm you will be tasked with spreading woodchip around the base of the trees. Doing this helps with general plant health and helps to establish the trees, allowing them to grow successfully. Other benefits to the woodchip are the suppressing of weeds and improving the soil.

#### **Planning Matters**

# Raise high the roof beam

After a long gestation period, progress is being made with the construction of four detached houses on the site of the former Early Intervention Centre, also known as 211 Simpson. Bricklaying will start early in March and the timber frames will be constructed on the

remaining two properties. The work is scheduled for completion in September. An artist's impression of what they might look like then can be found at www.zoopla.co.uk/for-sale/property/simpson Rather more certain is the new name: Bowlers Close.





#### Five Acres...

Meanwhile, Five Acres, the former Simpson Rectory, was sold at auction for £1,110,000 on 13 February. (When it was rebuilt in 1872 there was a mortgage of £580 which was paid off in 1934!)

The property has been unused since the care home closed, suddenly, in March 2017. In recent months the interior of the house has been significantly vandalised, so it is good to know that the new owner is taking immediate steps to secure the property. He is considering options, including the plans (approved by Milton Keynes Council in September 2019) to convert the house into nine residential units.

## **Simpson Drive Crossing**

The September 2019 Newsletter reported plans for a crossing of Simpson Drive into the picnic area car park. Those plans were subject to approval by other departments within MKC. Subsequently, the Highways Department and Road Safety Team raised concerns which have

led to significant changes. The raised asphalt section has been superseded by speed-reduction measures in the shape of verge-mounted speed indication devices (SID) in both directions which will inform drivers of their speed in this 30 mph zone. Road signs will be





introduced/upgraded to advise motorists to take care at the crossing point.

The crossing, itself, will be via a dropped kerb on both sides of Simpson Drive, leading to a surfaced path on the Linear Park side, running parallel with the road and entering the car park to the right of the existing height barrier. This will provide safe access for buggies, wheelchairs, mobility scooters etc. The Parks Trust has already cut back vegetation on the eastern side of Simpson Drive to improve sight lines for pedestrians and motorists alike.

The additional cost associated with these changes will be met by Milton Keynes Council. Work began on Monday 9 March.

# John Napleton

# January 1944 - February 2020

John Napleton died at home in Simpson on Friday 21 February. He had been in declining health for some time. John was not only a much-loved and respected member of our community, he was also pivotal in the success story of Milton Keynes.

He joined the Milton Keynes
Development Corporation (MKDC) in
1974, at the age of 30, to become the
Chief Engineer for highways and traffic.
As such, he was responsible for the
design of city-wide infrastructure,
including the standards for the grid
roads and junction designs.

In 1978 John was appointed Project Director of a team of architects, engineers and planners from MKDC to design a new federal capital for Nigeria. The creation of Abuja was intended to unite the country's different ethnic groups. The project team was located at *The Mount* in Simpson which, for four years, was the centre for one of the

world's largest construction projects, producing documents for over £2 billion (at 1978 prices) of new infrastructure and commercial buildings. John was recognised in Nigeria as a founding father of Abuja.

In 1983 he became Property
Management Director of MKDC,
directing all commercial, industrial and
housing activity in the city. He was
Managing Director of the CMK shopping
centre, at the time the largest shopping
mall in Europe. Then, from 1988, he
helped to put together the wind-up
programme for MKDC, including the
construction of all the remaining grid
roads, in the space of four years. He then
developed and formed the Milton
Keynes Parks Trust, the largest private
landscape trust in England.

After MKDC ended, John worked for the Commission for the New Towns. He played a major role as fundraiser for MK Theatre and Gallery. The Napleton Room

> at the theatre is testament to his achievements. He was also a strong supporter of public arts in MK and was a Trustee of the Public Arts Trust after its inauguration in 2010.

Following exposure to Simpson during the fouryear Abuja project at The



Mount, in 1983 John, Sue and their family moved to live at The Old Bakehouse, in the centre of the village. Despite heavy work demands, John played a significant part in the life of the community and those contributions increased when he retired from full-time work. He served on the Parish Council from 2009 to 2012 and his knowledge, contacts and advice proved invaluable in getting things done – the three SIMPSON signs at the entrances to the village and the roadside seat beside the road to Fenny Stratford are tangible legacies of his input.

John was also a regular attender at and supporter of a wide range of local events. In recent years, as multiple sclerosis took its toll on his physical abilities, he made his presence felt on his mobility scooter.

John will be sorely missed but he will live on in the collective memory as a man who gave so much to Milton Keynes, and to Simpson in particular.

On the first Tuesday of every month we welcome Ben, from the Hedgerows Centre, who is available to offer advice on matters such as housing, debt, neighbours or other relevant problems (no appointment is necessary).

## Rev Nicola Vidamour writes...

I am looking forward to experiencing my first spring in Milton Keynes. When I lived in Russia, winters were long and hard. It was so lifegiving to hear water trickling again as the ice thawed. Here, the flowers, bursting forth from buried bulbs, speak to me of the joyful message of Easter.

My deepest experiences of God have, however, been at times of pain and loss and so I find the whole journey of Lent and Holy Week - not just Easter Day – incredibly important and moving. The God I believe in is a God who shares in our human experience of suffering: who knows what it is like to make costly and difficult choices and to keep going when we would rather give up; who knows the hurt of broken relationships and of being betrayed by a kiss; who has to face physical agony, public humiliation and prayers of utter desperation. I meet in the Gospels a mother who has to watch her own son die: a man who commits suicide because he can't come to terms with his profound sense of failure; friends



who run away in fear when more is asked of them than they feel able to give.

Do you recognise yourself – or someone you know - in any of that? I am sure most of us do. The role of the church is not simply to offer


people the triumph of Easter Day when death is conquered by eternal life. The church is also there to accompany people on their path of sorrow.

So please don't feel that you must be full of the joys of spring to come to church. I want church to be a place where people can be real. Doubts and pain are as welcome as faith and joy.

I'm also very willing to come and meet you where you are. If there is something you would like to talk about confidentially – whether you come to church or not - please do get in touch and let's have a cup of tea together!

Thomas's Church and Simpson Village Hall and have been generously supported by friends and families, as well as those who live in Simpson and Ashland.


Well done all of us.
