

# A Royal Blue Visit

On Wednesday 11 October, The Prince of Wales visited the Blue Light Hub at West Ashland to highlight the importance of supporting the mental health of emergency responders during the week of World Mental Health Day.

Prince William was given a guided tour of the Hub, one of the first purposebuilt combined fire, police, and ambulance premises in the country, to witness first hand, how the blue light

services are working closely together to deliver the best possible service to the community.

The Prince spent time with a small group of staff from South Central Ambulance Service (SCAS) Thames Valley Police (TVP), Bucks Search and Rescue (BSAR) and BFRS. His Royal Highness has a longstanding commitment to encourage people to speak openly about their mental health



and the engagement session focused on the importance of mental wellbeing. Joining Prince William was the esteemed broadcaster, journalist, and psychologist,

> Dr Sian Williams, who facilitated discussions with individuals in the early stages of their careers. These conversations underscored the paramount importance of equipping emergency service personnel with the tools to safeguard their mental well-being and enhance their personal resilience.

Supporting the mental health of emergency responders is a cause close to the Prince's heart, as he saw first-hand the challenges emergency responders face on a daily basis while serving as a pilot with RAF search and rescue and East Anglian Air Ambulance.

### Parish road works

There will soon be restrictions on roads in the parish, while repairs are carried out.

Simpson Day Centre access road – Ringway are strengthening the foundation of the arch where it crosses Simpson Brook, repairing and strengthening the west brick headwall, and renewing the timber balustrade fences. The work will require a lane closure, with traffic lights, in Simpson Road. The work is scheduled to start on Monday 13 November and to last until Christmas. It will be a complex operation, as there needs to be vehicle access to and from the site.



**H9 Groveway** - there will be a 40 mph speed restriction while work is carried out on the bridge over the River Ouzel. The start date has yet to be confirmed.

## Apple Amble

Simpson Garden Group hosted an Apple Amble afternoon at the Village Hall on Saturday 2 September.

Claire Conway-Crapp and other members of Mid-Shires Orchard Group (MSOG) joined Simpson residents and friends on an amble around a few residents' gardens. Remaining ancient apple and fruit trees were observed and recorded by Claire, for MSOG information.





This activity built on research by Lena Bates, who has put together an amazing amount of information on the heritage fruit trees and orchards around Simpson.

Claire brought along old maps showing the positions of the original orchards in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. These were available in the Hall after the amble.

Lena led the amble around the gardens and into the community

garden, before heading for Hanmer Road Green to view the apple and pear trees planted in 2021. The fruit trees opposite the Village Hall, planted in 2022, were also recorded by Claire, for future reference.

Apple cake, drinks and biscuits were enjoyed back at the hall. Thanks go to all who came along and to the residents who kindly opened their gardens for us.

It is with sadness that we heard of the death of Dr David Baume on 5 July, at the age of 80.



### Dog waste bins

As dog walkers will be aware, the two waste bins adjacent to the canal towpath at Bowlers Bridge (Bridge 91) and south of Lickorish Bridge (Bridge 92) 'disappeared', without notice, towards the end of August. The Parish Council was quickly on the scent, in the shape of David Tucker, and it soon emerged that the Canal & River Trust had removed all bins along the canal towpath as an economy measure. That failed to recognize that the cost of emptying the bin at Bowlers Bridge was borne by the Parish Council, as part of the wider contract.

Following discussions, the Canal & River Trust has agreed to reinstate the bins in the same locations. DNH, the PC's contractor, will then service both of them. Thank you to those dog walkers who have found alternative deposit points for their bags.

### A Ton of Runs for Mental Health

I have lived in Simpson since July 2021 and running is central to my life. I will soon be celebrating my 100th Half Marathon at the Milton Keynes Winter Half, on Sunday 10 December. At the same time, I will be raising money for the mental health charity, Mind

My running journey started in 2003 after an accident led to a total hip replacement. Being told in your early thirties that you had to have an operation normally associated with people twice your age was devastating. I was fairly active at that time, playing numerous sports as well as running around after four young children. I thought I would be unable to do anything and that I was becoming old before my time.

But despite this blow, six months later, having made a full recovery, I

decided to take up running.... but not on a small scale, by entering the 2005 London Marathon, all 26.2 miles! Two decades, six full Marathons, 300 Parkruns (www.parkrun.org.uk) and almost 100 Half Marathons later, I still have the running bug and my hip is as good as new. With a busy homelife, a stressful job and the challenges of life in general, it is easy to allow things to get on top of you and feel overwhelmed. Running has been my escape. As well as the physical benefits, it is great for clearing the head, relieving stress and picking you up when feeling down. I often run on my own but I also love running with other people, which is why, for more than ten years I have been a member of the Redway Runners (www.redwayrunners.com). One of the biggest running clubs in the country, they are, in my opinion, the pride of Milton Keynes for everything



they do for members and the wider community... and such a great bunch of people! In MK we are blessed with so much open space and almost unlimited running/walking/cycling routes. It is truly a runners' paradise and one of the reasons we moved here.

# News from St. Thomas' Church

Our Harvest Festival Weekend in early October featured a service for dogs and their owners on the Saturday afternoon and an all-age service featuring The Very Hungry Caterpillar on the Sunday morning.

Harvest Festival donations were collected for the Foodbank. This year we committed to collect at least 350 cans in support of the MK Can event on 16 October. We are grateful to local residents who generously donated cans and enabled us to exceed our target. See the report of MK Can below.

Our 2023 wedding season finished on 2 September and we already have three weddings booked for next year. We have also interred the ashes of several local residents in the church yard, including

Our annual Light in the Darkness event will be on Saturday 4 November. The church will be open from 12.00 noon – 4.00 pm for all who would like to come and remember those who have died recently or long ago. Every half hour (at 12:15,12:45, 1:15, 1:45. 2:15, 2:45 3:15 and 3:45) one of the clergy will lead a short act of remembrance. If you would like your deceased friend(s) or family member(s) to be prayed for, please write their name(s) on the list which will be on a table near the door when you arrive. If you are unable to come but would still like your loved one to be remembered by name, please let us know.

We have recently received a report from an arboriculturalist who has confirmed that four trees are responsible for the structural problems at the east end of the church and will need either pruning or removing. If trees are removed, he suggests that consideration is given to planting one or more of a species with a good track record as far as lack of involvement in building damage is concerned, such as common hornbeam (Carpinus betulus) or field maple (Acer campestre), at least 10 metres from the

## MK Can

You will probably have seen media coverage of the huge event in Campbell Park on Monday 16 October, when an attempt was made on the Guinness World Record for the longest continuous line of cans of food. Many local

Nicola Vidamour had the additional responsibility of counting and confirming numbers on other parts of the line. The results were duly collated and early in the afternoon came the official announcement that the existing record had been well and truly smashed, with a total of 102,447 cans accounted for. All that remained was to collect up the cans, in crates, and take them to a drop-off






