MK Heritage Open Days is back again, from Friday 12 to Sunday 21 September. There is something for everyone as MK celebrates our fascinating heritage with a packed programme of over 250 family events. You can take a trip on the *Electra* canal boat, learn about our open spaces with The Parks Trust, take a guided bike ride through the city, enjoy craft workshops, visit a medieval fayre, explore a museum dedicated to all things Lego, find out about bees and above all have fun, share quality time and make some memories. All events are free to attend.

This year's theme is Architecture – 109 events across the city make the most of MK's architectural legacy, from ancient churches and farm buildings to the modernist marble-and-glass buildings that form the fabric of our city.



Join the Dotts ... E-scooter and e-bike parking

Milton Keynes City Council (MKCC) are working with bike and scooter operators, Dott and Lime to expand dedicated geofenced parking bays across Milton Keynes.

MKCC acknowledges the nuisance caused by inconsiderately placed e-scooters and bikes. The move towards geofenced parking areas for e-hire vehicles is designed to ensure that they are not abandoned in the 'public realm', causing obstruction and looking untidy, at the same time as remaining attractive, viable means of transport for many.

The geofenced parking areas will become the *only* places where hires can start and end. This should make a significant difference across MK, if these parking areas are sited

Phase 1 of the project has focussed on Central Milton Keynes. Designated parking areas have resulted in a marked difference in how the vehicles are parked there.

MKCC now wishes to work with parish and town councils to establish further designated, geofenced parking areas across the city. Operators have proposed locations, based on trip end points over the last 6 months and integrating with existing transport networks (e.g. bus stops) and avoiding Redways and footpaths.

It is acknowledged that some of these locations may not be suitable; if so, they can easily be moved or removed. There may be other areas that would be ideal for parking, and these can easily be added.

The pinpoints on the map give an approximate location of the

In due course, locations will be marked out on the operators' apps, and may be marked on the ground where necessary. They will be enforced using GPS technology and mandatory end-trip photos. Users who park bikes/scooters obstructively will be warned and then fined. Patrols will visit each location to tidy


Beginners



Skills for Healthy Living






Both sessions are from 2.00 to 4.00 and are free.

Next door neighbours to be



In early July, development finally started on the ground on the site to the south of H9 Groveway and east of the River Ouzel that will become the Walton Manor estate. Work is continuing apace and some of the infrastructure is visible from the perimeter path and Simpson Road, including the base of one of the access roads. As the plan indicates, traffic to

and from the southern third of the estate will enter/exit to and from Simpson Road. The northern two thirds will leave and enter via the Walton Drive roundabout on H9 Groveway.

Once occupied, the new arrivals will not be the first settlers, there. In January and February, before building



work began, there was an archaeological dig in the top northwest corner of the site, where previous research had found indications of a possible Iron Age settlement, perhaps dating from around 500 BCE. A small team from Oxford Archaeology carried out the excavations which, we understand, have uncovered further evidence of a settlement. We are in discussion with Oxford Archaeology about the prospect of a talk and display in early 2026. Look out for more information.

Nature Corner

We are fortunate to live in an area of Milton Keyes which is rich with wildlife in easy reach – birds in gardens and on and around Ashland Lakes, Caldecotte Lake and the Ousel Valley Park; and foxes, grey squirrels and hedgehogs. Some species are with us all the year round; others are summer or winter visitors. The latter include Wigeon, a duck which arrives at Ashland in the autumn, travelling all the way from Siberia.

And there are some more 'exotic' recent sightings within the mix. Janice Robertson is a Milton Keynes naturalist who conducts a monthly count of Ashland Lakes' birdlife, on behalf of the British Trust for Ornithology. During a visit on 16 July she spotted a Mediterranean Gull, readily distinguished from the resident Black-





headed Gulls by its much blacker head and thick red bill, both features evident in Janice's photograph. She read the number on the ring on the bird's leg and was able to trace its history. Ringed as a chick in Leipzig, Germany,

> in June 2018, the gull has found its way to the Milton Keynes area, on and off, since November 2019, when it was recorded in Newton Lees. Since then, it's been spotted at Willen Lake North (2021) and Mount

Farm Lake (2022; 2024). Prior to its recent appearance in Ashland, it was last recorded in the Netherlands in

Simpson resident Rebecca Hiorns has a trail camera in her Lissel Road garden, which is activated by the movement of nighttime wildlife. At 03.30 on Thursday 21 August the camera captured what appears to be a polecat. Rebecca is currently researching her sighting. Have you seen anything of the sort, or evidence of its possible activity? Information is available at www.wildlifetrusts.org/wildlife-

Simpson War memorial



In June 2022, the faded names inscribed on the war memorial were repainted by H.W.Mason & Sons. However, the black surface deteriorated over a short period of time until, by earlier this year names were indecipherable. Masons agreed to rectify the problem and in June the granite tablet was restored to its former glory, shortly after the 80th anniversary of the end of World War 2.


